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an introduction to complex analysis for students with some knowledge of complex numbers from high school it contains sixteen chapters the first eleven of which are aimed at an upper division undergraduate audience the remaining five chapters are designed to complete the coverage of all background necessary for passing phd qualifying exams in complex analysis topics studied include julia sets and the mandelbrot set dirichlet series and the prime number theorem and the uniformization theorem for riemann surfaces with emphasis placed on the three geometries spherical euclidean and hyperbolic throughout exercises range from the very simple to the challenging the book is based on lectures given by the author at several universities including ucla brown university la plata buenos aires and the universidad autonomo de valencia spain

complex analysis for science and technology is a textbook for undergraduate and postgraduate students undertaking science technology engineering and mathematics stem courses the book begins with an introduction to basic complex numbers followed by chapters covering complex functions integrals transformations and conformal mapping topics such as complex series and residue theory are also covered key features of this textbook include simple easy to understand explanations of relevant concepts a wide range of simple and complex examples several figures where appropriate

complex dynamics is today very much a focus of interest though several fine expository articles were available by p blanchard and by m yu lyubich in particular until recently there was no single source where students could find the material with proofs for anyone in our position gathering and organizing the material required a great deal of work going through preprints and papers and in some cases even finding a proof we hope that the results of our efforts will be of help to others who plan to learn about complex dynamics and perhaps even lecture meanwhile books in the field a re beginning to appear the stony brook course notes of j milnor were particularly welcome and useful still we hope that our special emphasis on the analytic side will satisfy a need this book is a revised and expanded version of notes based on lectures of the first author at ucla over several vinter quarters particularly 1986 and 1990 we owe chris bishop a great deal of gratitude for supervising the production of course notes adding new material and making computer pictures we have used his computer pictures and we will also refer to the attractive color graphics in the popular treatment of h o peitgen and p richter we have benefited from discussions with a number of colleagues and from suggestions of students in both our courses

discrete dynamical systems are essentially iterated functions given the ease with which computers can do iteration it is now possible for anyone with access to a personal computer to generate beautiful images whose roots lie in discrete dynamical systems images of mandelbrot and julia sets abound in publications both mathematical and not the mathematics behind the pictures are beautiful in

their own right and are the subject of this text the level of the presentation is suitable for advanced undergraduates with a year of calculus behind them students in the author's courses using this material have come from numerous disciplines many have been majors in other disciplines who are taking mathematics courses out of general interest concepts from calculus are reviewed as necessary mathematica programs that illustrate the dynamics and that will aid the student in doing the exercises are included in an appendix

translated from the french this book is an introduction to first order model theory starting from scratch it quickly reaches the essentials namely the back and forth method and compactness which are illustrated with examples taken from algebra it also introduces logic via the study of the models of arithmetic and it gives complete but accessible exposition of stability theory

the aim of this book is twofold i to give an exposition of the basic theory of finite dimensional algebras at a levelthat isappropriate for senior undergraduate and first year graduate students and ii to provide the mathematical foundation needed to prepare the reader for the advanced study of anyone of several fields of mathematics the subject under study is by no means new indeed it is classical yet a book that offers a straightforward and concrete treatment of this theory seems justified for several reasons first algebras and linear trans formations in one guise or another are standard features of various parts of modern mathematics these include well entrenched fields such as repre sentation theory as well as newer ones such as quantum groups second a study of the elementary theory offinite dimensional algebras is particularly useful in motivating and casting light upon more sophisticated topics such as module theory and operator algebras indeed the reader who acquires a good understanding of the basic theory of algebras is wellpositioned to ap preciate results in operator algebras representation theory and ring theory in return for their efforts readers are rewarded by the results themselves several of which are fundamental theorems of striking elegance

survey and research articles in six areas algebra analysis applied mathematics geometry probability and topology their topics range from current developments related to well known open problems to novel interactions between pure mathematics and computer science most of the articles provide a panoramic view of the fields and problems the authors work on making the book accessible to advanced graduate students and researchers in mathematics from different fields this book is published in cooperation with sociedad matemática mexicana

this book explains the basic methods of modern cryptography it is written for readers with only basic mathematical knowledge who are interested in modern cryptographic algorithms and their mathematical foundation several exercises are included following each chapter from the reviews gives a clear and systematic introduction into the subject whose popularity is ever increasing and can be recommended to all who would like to learn about cryptography zentralblatt math

this is an introduction to the theory and applications of modern geometry it differs from other books in its field in its emphasis on applications and its discussion of special relativity as a major example of a non euclidean geometry besides special relativity it covers two other important areas of non euclidean geometry spherical geometry used in navigation and astronomy and projective geometry used in art in addition it reviews many useful topics from euclidean geometry emphasizing transformations and includes a chapter on conics and planetary orbits applications are stressed throughout the book every topic is motivated by an application and many additional applications are given in the exercises the book would be an excellent introduction to higher geometry for those students especially prospective mathematics and teachers who need to know how geometry is used in addition to its formal theory

this book is an introduction to hyperbolic and differential geometry that provides material in the early chapters that can serve as a textbook for a standard upper division course on hyperbolic geometry for that material the students need to be familiar with calculus and linear algebra and willing to accept one advanced theorem from analysis without proof the book goes well beyond the standard course in later chapters and there is enough material for an honors course or for supplementary reading indeed parts of the book have been used for both kinds of courses even some of what is in the early chapters would surely not be nec essary for a standard course for example detailed proofs are given of the jordan curve theorem for polygons and of the decomposability of poly gons into triangles these proofs are included for the sake of completeness but the results themselves are so believable that most students should skip the proofs on a first reading the axioms used are modern in character and more user friendly than the traditional ones the

familiar real number system is used as an in gredient rather than appearing as a result of the axioms however it should not be thought that the geometric treatment is in terms of models this is an axiomatic approach that is just more convenient than the traditional ones

the study of composition operators forges links between fundamental properties of linear operators and beautiful results from the classical theory of analytic functions this book provides a self contained introduction to both the subject and its function theoretic underpinnings the development is geometrically motivated and accessible to anyone who has studied basic graduate level real and complex analysis the work explores how operator theoretic issues such as boundedness compactness and cyclicity evolve in the setting of composition operators on the hilbert space h2 into questions about subordination value distribution angular derivatives iteration and functional equations each of these classical topics is developed fully and particular attention is paid to their common geometric heritage as descendants of the schwarz lemma

this volume connects complex analysis with calculus algebra geometry topology and analysis exercises and illustrations are provided throughout the text also included is information on bergman kernal and two boundary behaviour of conformal mappings

the subject of space filling curves has fascinated mathematicians for over a century and has intrigued many generations of students of mathematics working in this area is like skating on the edge of reason unfortunately no comprehensive treatment has ever been attempted other than the gallant effort by w sierpiriski in 1912 at that time the subject was still in its infancy and the most interesting and perplexing results were still to come besides sierpiriski s paper was written in polish and published in a journal that is not readily accessible sierpiriski 2 most of the early literature on the subject is in french german and polish providing an additional raison d etre for a comprehensive treatment in english while there was understandably some intensive research activity on this subject around the turn of the century contributions have nevertheless continued up to the present and there is no end in sight indicating that the subject is still very much alive the recent interest in fractals has refocused interest on space filling curves and the study of fractals has thrown some new light on this small but venerable part of mathematics this monograph is neither a textbook nor an encyclopedic treatment of the subject nor a historical account but it is a little of each while it may lend

structure to a seminar or pro seminar or be useful as a supplement in a course on topology or mathematical analysis it is primarily intended for self study by the aficionados of classical analysis

this book consists of contributions by the participants of the fifth conference on function spaces held at southern illinois university in may of 2006 the papers cover a broad range of topics including spaces and algebras of analytic functions of one and of many variables and operators on such spaces I p spaces spaces of banach valued functions isometries of function spaces geometry of banach spaces and other related subjects the goal of the conference was to bring together mathematicians interested in various problems related to function spaces and to facilitate the exchange of ideas between people working on similar problems hence the majority of papers in this book are accessible to non experts some articles contain expositions of known results and discuss open problems others contain new results

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
